Over the road, by the waters edge you 'll be,


Many a time, many a ship there has been wrecked, A burning light was surely kept,

Heading south towards the beach, cross over Cliff Road and take the path onto the cliff top where you will see a view of The Needles and you will be able to answer this clue from here.



Ríddle 3

Heading East along the shore, This was once a place of war,

With metal spikes upon the beach, And battle guns within its reach,

For now we see the huts in colours bright, Erosion is the deadly fight,

So shingle, rocks and boulders they have placed, Upon a sandy beach once graced,

Walk eastwards along the coastline, passed all the new coloured beach huts and concrete walkway until you get to the second carpark. There are public toilets on the way if you need to use them.



Ríddle 4

Home for the weary visitors flight, Watery bed of marsh, beholds a sight,

They come from far and wide, To stay awhile and hide,

Before they journey on afar, Winter Wader, Wild fowl admire,

Or summer Rail and Warbler spot, This surely is a special lot,

Upon a board on gravel parked Name the Pond with wild birds marked,

Still heading east, follow the shoreline to a gravel car park at the very end of the path.

Behind the white building (The Lighthouse) there is a black metal gate which leads to the wooden hide. From here you can view the reserve, known as Sturt Pond and the different species there.

The gate is open 9am – 5pm everyday. If it is locked the answer to your clue will be found on the board in the car park, or here below.

NOTE: Please note the ferry only runs from the end of March to the end of October.

Only walk the 1.5 mile Spit if you have good footwear. The shingle is deep and loose.

Ríddle 5

Keep going along the shingle, Hurry for you dare not dwindle,

Take the fork down Saltgrass Lane, Or walk the pebbled plank of pain,


Choose the road, and you be merry, To sail the Solent water's ferry,

Brave the shingle bank and you may gloat, Yet weary legs return by boat,

The answer lies below the ridge, What waters pass beneath the bridge.

Here you have two choices

- 1. Cross over the bridge and walk to Keyhaven as shown, where you can catch a ferry over to Hurst Castle when it is running, or miss out the castle and carry on to Keyhaven.
- 2. Or walk the length of the 1.5 mile Spit to Hurst Castle. It takes about 3/4hr each way. Thick loose shingle so only take this option if you have good footwear! You can take the ferry back to Keyhaven during the summer months.







Ríddle 6

A Castle built to guard our coast, Once extended lost its moat,

Many a battle it has seen, From Tudor Times to World Wars been,

> Make the trip or miss it out, History is what it's all about,

There was a King who built this fort, His name's the answer sort.

Take the ferry to Hurst castle from Keyhaven or walk along the spit to the castle and lighthouse. You can miss this step out.

The walk takes about 45minutes each way, if you amble.

The ferry runs at 10am and goes roughly every 20minutes. The last ferry is at 5.30pm (27th March – 31st October)



Ríddle 7

A tiny quay forward bound, Made its trade from salt marsh found,

The village small has views of splendour, This way of life they did surrender,

Where water flows over the edge, To carry salt that was once dredged,

what am I who once aided the work, Of villagers toil in waters murk?

If you are at the castle take the ferry back to Keyhaven and you will arrive at your destination.

If you took the walk along the road, then you are already there.

Follow the path along the water's edge until you are at the car par on Saltgrass lane. There you will find the sluice





Ríddle 8

All six a village mourned they've gone, So placed a memory with names upon,

From Keyhaven sea wall follow the map to join Lower Pennington Lane. The memorial will be found at the junction of Keyhaven Road as marked with an 'x'. From here turn right away from the village.



** There are public toilets at this point**



If you follow the red dotted line you will walk by the pond again. Be aware, this area floods so you may need to take the blue route.

Ríddle 10

From the path you will emerge, Into the village traffic will surge,


Ancient grazing here was seen, Enjoy a seat upon the green,
